



Heterodox Academy Faculty Fellowships on Intellectual Pluralism

Heterodox Academy seeks to support up to three visiting faculty members at the HxA Center for Academic Pluralism in New York City.

A major new initiative of Heterodox Academy, the Center for Academic Pluralism will open and begin hosting scholars in September 2023. The mission of the Center is to explore the theoretical and empirical foundations for intellectual pluralism and share our findings with academics around the country. Why should professors welcome diverse perspectives—even challenging perspectives—in the classroom? How is inclusion compatible with intellectual rigor? What are the best objections to intellectual pluralism? How might we shift the ways intellectual pluralism is understood, discussed and operationalized in light of these objections?

Through the generous support of Templeton Religion Trust, the Center for Academic Pluralism at HxA will convene scholars across disciplines, institutions and institutional roles to make progress on questions like these.

Faculty fellows will work in conjunction with HxA staff and postdoctoral fellows – and alongside HxA members and affiliates in the New York City area – to conduct individual research projects, present and receive feedback on their work, write publicly about the issues related to their focus areas, enter into dialogue with intellectual rivals, convene other academics for collaboration, and distill their findings in an annotated bibliography that can serve as a resource for other scholars interested in the questions they explored over the course of their fellowship.

In addition to academic duties, Fellows are expected to share their work and perspectives in Heterodox Academy events and outlets, such as conferences, blog posts, and podcasts. Fellows will also be spotlighted in HxA's extensive network of scholars, partner organizations and affiliates in order to help accelerate their career and advance their work.

Fellowship Selection and Criteria

Applicants should hold a faculty or emeritus faculty position at an institution of higher learning.

The ideal candidate should have a solid track record of original research and/or public engagement. Candidates must also propose a scholarly project with a clear focus on academic or intellectual pluralism. A partial list of questions or themes that projects might speak to include:

- What are the ethical obligations of research and teaching in a pluralistic context?
- What are the cognitive obstacles to rational inquiry, especially with regards to controversial topics?
- Why do we disagree about important topics? How does disagreement become acrimonious? How can these disagreements be rendered less acrimonious?
- If and how can disagreement, even on sensitive or highly-charged topics, be effectively leveraged in the service of producing and disseminating knowledge (and other institutional objectives)?
- What role can or should religion play in ostensibly secular institutions and fields of inquiry?
- Does secularism create space for different worldviews to co-exist and constructively engage with one-another, or does it implicitly and perhaps inevitably denigrate religious, spiritual or otherwise non-secular forms of knowing? How and to what extent can there be religious pluralism without secularism?
- Is it possible to truly take religion and its accompanying metaphysical, moral and epistemological commitments seriously within a secular context? How, to what extent, and in what senses?
- How do institutions and incentives shape scholarly practice?
- How can academic institutions and norms be changed effectively?
- To what extent do shared goals and superordinate identities facilitate or impede the expression of dissent or constructive disagreement?
- How, under what circumstances and to what extent do different forms of diversity enhance or present challenges for research, teaching, learning and cooperation?
- What does quantitative evidence reveal about the contemporary state of intellectual pluralism in higher education institutions?

The primary selection criteria are as follows:

- Originality, quality, and relevance of applicant's proposed project to intellectual and/or academic pluralism
- Demonstrated ability to conduct research and perform other academic tasks substantiated by the candidate's previous track record of original research and publications



- Availability and willingness to actively participate in the academic life of the Center for Academic Pluralism, including a commitment to be physically present in New York City during the tenure of the postdoctoral fellowship – either residing in the city or regularly commuting – for weekly meetings and regular work time.
- Practical or professional experience working on issues related to political, religious, or other forms of pluralism may also be considered an asset.

Application Process

Review of applications will begin immediately and appointments will be made on a rolling basis. The deadline for receiving applications is **March 17, 2023**.

- Research proposal (four pages maximum)
- At least one writing sample (from peer-reviewed publications, if possible)

Salary & Benefits

Fellows appointed for a full-time nine-month appointment will be expected to begin on September 5, 2023. These appointments will include an award of \$100,000 that can be used for course buyouts and/ or to supplement Fellows’ existing salaries. Benefits are not included in this appointment and should be provided by applicants’ primary employer.

For those unable to commit to a full academic-year appointment, individual semester and short-term appointments may also be available at a prorated rate. Applicants should state their preference and availability at the time of application.

Renewal is possible after a Fellow's initial term has concluded but cannot be guaranteed.
